

Eagle Rock History is Online

One of the most important things we can do in life is to pass on our stories to future generations. We all have mementos like a trove of photos of school graduation or of the house where you grew up or grandpa standing next to his 1939 Lincoln Zephyr Coupe. Or, perhaps, you just found some photographs of the 1914 opening of the first public library in Eagle Rock and now you would like to know how to share them with the most people



possible. Now imagine that you can share these details of your life with others interested in our community's history.

What if you want to know what the rest of the world will find when they Google search "Eagle Rock"? The first result will probably be Wikipedia. Are you amused, outraged or fascinated by what you find there? You can correct or add documented facts to our entry.

Are you looking for a notice of your grandparent's wedding or when your home was sold or built? Do you need documentation or dates to add to our Wikipedia entry? Many newspapers are now available online, complete with text you can copy and edit.

At the Center for the Arts, Eagle Rock at 7:00 P.M. on February 17th, we'll take a look at 3 historical online resources that make it possible for us to explore and share our local history: HistoryPin, a map-based site where users can "pin" images and other media to locations and share stories; Wikipedia, a crowd-sourced encyclopedia that allows anyone to contribute their own knowledge; and the California Digital Newspaper Collection which provides a searchable archive of historical and current California newspapers. Anne Mar, Assistant College Archivist and Metadata Specialist at the Occidental College Library, will lead a discussion and interactive session on how to use these resources, with a focus on Eagle Rock. Come with your own stories and ideas!

On the Corner 1910-2015

What did the southwest corner of Eagle Rock and Colorado Boulevards look like in the 1910s? And what does that exact spot look like now? If you would like to share these views with the most people possible, there's an online tool for that!

HistoryPin is a website that allows users to "pin" images and video to their relevant locations on a map. Its goal is to unite people "from across different generations, cultures, and places, around the history of their families and neighborhoods" It is a free resource that invites anyone to contribute their own materials and stories.

They were torn down by a later owner in order to build this building, designed for the Bank of America, which reopened there in 1937. It moved from across Eagle Rock Boulevard.

The building remained but the bank had moved across Colorado to its present location. The trolley tracks ended here in 1952. Service would be discontinued in 1957.



The building and several adjoining were torn down in the early 1970s to construct a gas station. Increased highway business was anticipated. This is the view today.
